

Welcome from Arts Council England



I am delighted to welcome delegates to the third World Summit on Arts and Culture, hosted in 2006 by Arts Council England and organised in partnership with IFACCA. As the national development agency for

the arts within England, we believe – with everyone taking part in this Summit – in the power of the arts to challenge, inspire and change.

The arts play a very important role on the international scene – culturally and economically. At the Arts Council we want to contribute to the international cultural debate and dialogue, and to learn from our international partners, we hope to achieve this through the Summit.

Major international agencies are addressing the role of cities in economic and social regeneration in the developing and developed world. We will work to ensure that links between the arts and regeneration agendas are at the centre of international debates on cultural policy.

As well as hosting the Summit, 2006 marks the 60th anniversary of the granting of the royal charter to Arts Council England.

In 1946 the original aims of the Arts Council placed equal emphasis on supporting arts of the highest quality and increasing public access to the arts across the country. Over the decades these twin ambitions have remained at the centre of our activities. In 2006 we still hold firm to our belief that the arts have the power to transform lives and communities, and to create opportunities as well.

In the UK we have two major cultural regeneration opportunities ahead of us: Liverpool, European Capital of Culture 2008 and the London Olympics 2012. We want to use these opportunities to build international partnerships and contribute to the debate about city, the arts, culture and heritage.

With speakers from 30 countries and with delegates from over 50 countries, the Summit is sure to help strengthen existing, and forge many new international partnerships and exchanges.

Organising the Summit has been a great privilege for Arts Council England and we hope that delegates will be inspired by the many examples of arts activity and cultural regeneration that the Summit will provide.

Welcome from IFACCA



With this World Summit on Arts and Culture, government arts support agencies have now enjoyed three World Summits and the International Federation of Arts Councils and Culture Agencies (IFACCA) once again takes stock.

If the first World Summit (Ottawa 2000) was about IFACCA's birth, and the second Summit (Singapore 2003) was about its formalisation, this third Summit is surely about its growth.

The Federation's membership now covers more than 60 countries on five continents, and is growing. But our growth has not just been in numbers, it has also been in reputation. We are now seen as an organisation that does things.

There is a parallel here with the wider world of arts and cultural policy that is, I believe, no coincidence. Interest in cultural policy has been growing for many years. We in the cultural sector have always known the importance of arts and culture to people, communities and societies, but now those outside the sector are starting to recognise this importance.


With this wider appeal come challenges for arts and cultural decision-makers – to do more, and to do better, often with the same resources. And with wider recognition comes the rising pressure of instrumentality, visible across the spectrum of cultural policies, which tests artistic and cultural principles and demands the delicate balancing of multiple objectives.

Growth inevitably brings challenges, and these are indeed challenging times for national arts support agencies. IFACCA was in some ways a response to the intensifying challenges in cultural policy, born as it was from a need to share scarce resources, to raise standards, and to strengthen the voice of arts and culture. Though we are a small organisation, with just three staff and a limited budget, the achievements described in our five-year report (included in this Summit pack) illustrate how, through collaborating and brokering partnerships, we have created valuable resources to help policymakers improve support to arts and culture everywhere. Clearly these successes have satisfied a previously unmet demand. They could not have been possible without the support and vision of IFACCA members.

Nowhere is the need and benefit of the Federation more obvious than at World Summits. With so many countries represented in NewcastleGateshead, we are guaranteed an intense, stimulating and productive five days. On behalf of the board and members of IFACCA, I welcome you to the third World Summit on Arts and Culture, and I thank Arts Council England for its immense hard work in ensuring that this Summit will be a great success and another landmark for the Federation.

Welcome from the Summit Programme Director



When Arts Council England bid to host the World Summit in NewcastleGateshead, cultural regeneration was the obvious theme. A region on the edge and lacking cultural opportunities has

become a thriving cultural destination as a result of a 10-year capital strategy led by the Arts Council and several visionary leaders in local government and the arts.

When IFACCA visited NewcastleGateshead in May 2004, The Sage Gateshead was yet to open but the decision to hold the event here was made.

It has been a challenge, honour and privilege to be Programme Director of the Summit and to be in contact with so many people across the world. I would like to pay special thanks to Susie Hargreaves, the Summit Coordinator, and to the many people in the Arts Council, the region and IFACCA who have helped us to grow the Summit into a five-day event which will hopefully live up to its title.

Selecting speakers and case studies from the 290 which came forward was not an easy task. Our vision was to find inspirational people and projects that had transformed places and transformed lives. We wanted artists who had themselves delivered projects on the ground as well as inspirational policymakers and researchers who could shed a global light on the powerful

story of regeneration through the arts and culture. We needed to ensure that the programme had relevance to developing countries and to those who are fighting for the position of the arts and culture in more crowded economies.

We set targets to double the size of the Summit and to bring delegates from at least 50 countries. If everyone arrives we will have passed both those milestones, with over 500 people from 68 countries.

The Summit has inspired a year of cultural events in NewcastleGateshead. The programme of public events to accompany the Summit will include artists' commissions and performances, as well as practical examples of international collaboration with other nations. Our ambition for the World Summit on Arts and Culture is to start a series of international conversations, to share experiences and good practice from across the world and to forge new networks.

Finally, we would like to thank you, the delegates, for making the journey. We aim to offer you a glimpse of NewcastleGateshead and North East England through the tours and visits. We hope you find reasons to return.

Speaker profiles

Risto Ruohonen, Director of Arts and Cultural Heritage Division, Ministry of Education
Risto Ruohonen was appointed Director of Arts and
Cultural Heritage and Special Government Advisor at
the Ministry of Education, Finland in February 2003,
having previously been the Chairman (CEO) of the
Arts Council of Finland since 1998. He has also served
as the president of the ARSBALTICA network since
1999. Before joining the Arts Council, he was the
Managing Director and Theatre Director first in the
Lahti Municipal Theatre and then at the Helsinki City
Theatre for 12 years.

Peter Hewitt, Chief Executive, Arts Council England
Peter Hewitt was appointed Chief Executive of the
Arts Council in March 1998. Since then, he has led a
major overhaul of the organisation including a merger
with the 10 previously independent regional arts
boards. Peter's career in the arts began in 1976 at
Inter-Action in Kentish Town, London. He was Arts
Officer at North Tyneside Metropolitan Borough
Council for six years before joining Northern Arts in
1982. He was made Chief Executive of Northern Arts
in 1992 and held this post for five years. He then had
a year in the Health Service as Corporate Affairs
Director of Tees Health Authority.

Sir Ken Robinson, Author

Sir Ken Robinson is an internationally recognised leader in the development of creativity, innovation and human resources. Now based in Los Angeles, he has worked with governments in Europe, Asia and the USA, Fortune 500 companies and some of the world's leading cultural organisations. In 1988, he led a national commission on the creativity, education and the economy for the UK government. 'All Our Futures: Creativity, Culture and Education' was published to wide acclaim in 1999. In June 2003, he was awarded a knighthood.

David Puttnam, Lord Puttnam of Queensgate, CBE, President of UNICEF

David Puttnam spent 30 years as an independent film producer. He was Chief Executive of Columbia Pictures from 1986 to 1988 – the only non-American ever to run a Hollywood Studio. He retired from film to focus on education. In 2002, he was appointed President of UNICEF UK. David was awarded a CBE in 1982, a knighthood in 1995 and appointed to the House of Lords in 1997. In France he has been honoured as a Chevalier and, later, an Officer of Arts and Letters.

Ammar Khammash, Architect

Ammar Khammash runs his own architectural company in Jordan, working on over 39 different projects including renovation of King Abdulla's (the first) headquarters as well as winning two high-profile design competitions. Ammar is also an active advocate, promoting heritage, culture and the environment, sitting on several boards within Jordan. He is also a published author, photographer and artist.

Martha Senn, Director, Culture and Tourism Institute of Bogotá

Martha Senn is Director of Culture and Tourism for Bogotá in Colombia. She is also a singer and has performed in many of the world's great opera houses and concert halls.

Sir Christopher Frayling, Chair, Arts Council England Sir Christopher Frayling joined Arts Council England in February 2004 as Chairman. Sir Christopher is Rector of the Royal College of Art in London, and Professor of Cultural History there. An historian, a critic and a broadcaster, he is well known for his work on BBC Radio 4, BBC Radio 3 and Channel 4. Sir Christopher is a trustee of the Victoria and Albert Museum (since 1983), and was a member of the Arts Council of England (1987–2000) having chaired successively its Visual Arts, Combined Arts, Education and Film, Video and Broadcasting panels.

Speaker profiles

Rick Lowe, Artist and Founder, Project Row Houses Rick Lowe is the founder of Project Row Houses. He is a practising artist and has exhibited across the world including USA, Japan and Korea. He has won many awards including being the year 2000 recipient of the American Institute of Architecture Keystone Award. He serves on a number of boards including the Houston Visitors and Conventions Board.

Justice Albie Sachs, Justice of the Constitutional Court of South Africa

Justice Albie Sachs started practice as an advocate at the Cape Bar, aged 21. The bulk of his work involved defending people charged with racist statutes and repressive security laws. Following a period of detention, including being placed in solitary confinement, Albie went into exile in Mozambique where he worked as a law professor. In 1988, he was blown up by a bomb placed in his car by South African security agents, losing an arm and the sight of an eye. During the 1980s he worked closely with Oliver Tambo, leader of the ANC in exile. In 1990, he returned home as a member of the constitutional committee and National Executive of the ANC. In 1994, he was appointed by President Mandela to serve on the newly established Constitutional Court.

Jude Kelly OBE, Artistic Director, South Bank Centre Jude Kelly is the South Bank Centre's new Artistic Director and Chair of Culture and Education for London's successful bid for the 2012 Olympic Games. Jude is an award winning theatre Director and has directed over 40 productions for stage and screen and received the OBE for services to theatre.

Craig Hassall, Managing Director, English National Ballet

Craig Hassall joined English National Ballet as Managing Director in 2005. Prior to this he was Deputy General Manager of the Sydney Theatre Company. Between 1997–2000, Craig was responsible for the cultural programme of the Sydney 2000 Olympic Games.

Beatriz Garcia, RCUK Academic Fellow, Centre for Cultural Policy Research

Beatriz Garcia is a researcher in cultural policy and event-led regeneration exploring models for cultural impact. Recent publications study the legacy of cultural programming within events such as the Olympic Games, Commonwealth Games and the European Capital of Culture. She has been invited to present her work worldwide including the International Olympic Academy (Greece) and The Centre for Olympic Research (Beijing).

Gaétan Morency, Vice President of Public, Social and Cultural Affairs, Cirque du Soleil Gaétan Morency is a member of Cirque du Soleil's Executive Forum and has been a member of the senior management team since 1992. He has worked for more than 25 years in the cultural field. Prior to joining Cirque du Soleil, he worked as a producer of shows and other cultural events. Gaétan is also President and Founder of the Tohu – Cité des arts du Cirque, and Vice President of Culture Montréal.

Simon Brault, Director General, National Theatre School of Canada/Vice Chair of the Canada Council Simon Brault has been Director General of the National Theatre of Canada since 1997. Prior to this he was the School's Administrative Director. A long time advocate for cultural communities and a self described 'cultural development militant', Simon began a five-year term as Vice Chair of the Canada Council on 31 March, 2004.

Dr Tom Shakespeare, Chair, Arts Council England, North East

Dr Tom Shakespeare is Chair of Arts Council England, North East. Tom has been Director of Outreach at the Policy, Ethics and Life Sciences Research Institute, University of Newcastle upon Tyne since 1999. He acts as a researcher, author and lecturer in science, specifically in genetics and disability. In the arts, he has been a writer, performer and documentary filmmaker, helping devise new work for a dance company, working with Graeae Theatre Company and presenting TV documentaries for the BBC and Channel 4. He was Founding Chair of Northern Disability Arts Forum and Founding Chair of children's musical theatre company, Monster Productions. Tom is also a board member of Northern Film + Media and a member of the British Council's Arts Advisory Committee. He was a former Board member and Vice Chair of Northern Arts.




